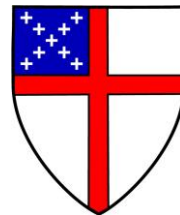

# CLERGY CORNER



Dear Friends in Christ,

A New Year is upon us as we move farther along our Interim Voyage. The turning of the calendar to 2018 represents much in the life of Church of the Good Shepherd (CGS). As always, with a new year we take a look back to see where we have travelled thus far. It's been about a year since Pastor Odie announced his retirement following three decades of service to CGS. Over the first half of the year we had an opportunity to say good-bye with lots of laughter, love and storytelling.

As that important work was being done, myself, the Personnel Committee, Executive Committee, Vestry and Lay Staff searched for and hired The Rev. Kate Harmon Siberine as our Curate and The Rev. Fred Reynolds as our Consultant for this Interim Period. We also hired our new Youth Director, Nancy Madeira—welcoming her back to the program in a new way. Additionally, the Vestry approved and appointed our Lay Minister Search Committee Chairs, Judy Mulligan and Chris Sherman.

With spring giving way to summertime we enjoyed our usual laid-back rhythm of life—taking a break from school year programming and moving to two services on Sunday. For me, the summer was a time to re-set cadences with the community after saying good-bye to our Rector before welcoming Pastor Kate. Then, by early August we were ramping up again anticipating another bustling program year. As Pastor Kate on boarded in late August I simply said, “It’s like that movie *Divergent* where you have to run alongside and jump onto a moving train.” Although I never had a doubt, it’s been wonderful to see Kate not only jump on the moving train but integrate her skills for ministry and passion for mission into life at Good Shepherd as our Interim Voyage continues.

By autumn, our Search Committee Chairs—Chris Sherman and Judy Mulligan—had done the essential work of accepting applications for its members with Pastor Fred’s consultation and guidance. Since November the Search Committee has met monthly while developing a plan to begin work of a ministry inventory and parish profile with the community.

This all leads us to today—as we once again stand at the threshold of a new beginning. In the year ahead, I’m excited to see where the movement of the Holy Spirit brings us as we move more deeply into our New Rector Search. Over the last months there’s a sense that Good Shepherd is growing more into its identity as a faithful community—allowing ourselves to describe and honor the past while having agency and a sense of empowerment to define the future. Our essential work is to live more fully into who Christ is calling us to be as a witness to his life in the world. By doing this, CGS will be well positioned to open its arms and heart to a new Pastor to lead into that new future.

In order to do this, in the coming months some of that definition will emerge with a Worship Committee and Visioning Team convening. The Worship Committee will take a look at the liturgical practice of the community, facilitate a conversation of self-reflection with the community and build resiliency for a variety of approaches to worship as the CGS anticipates welcoming a new Rector. Pastor Kate, Brett Greene, John Townsend and myself will begin this work. The Visioning Team will be a gathering of lay and clergy leadership looking at the larger mission and ministry of CGS visioning ministry in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century as a faith community. Its members will consist of lay ministers already stewarding ministries alongside clergy leadership.

As we have seen over the last six months CGS will continue keeping faithful to our identity in Christ as a unique expression of the Gospel's Good News while allowing room to be re-shaped and re-formed in Christ's image in the world today. As ever I am grateful to walk beside you on this path!

#### Transition News: Frequently Asked Questions

What will the Search Process look like for finding a New Rector and when will it begin?

This past Fall the Search Committee Chairs-Judy Mulligan and Chris Sherman worked on the formation of the committee. Search Committee Members have been selected and confirmed. On Sunday, January 7<sup>th</sup> the Search Committee will host the Sunday Forum at 9am as well as be “Commissioned” during the 9:45am service. They have been working with the Interim Consultant (Pastor Fred Reynolds) and Diocesan Staff on creating an outline of the search plan.

Why does the new Rector search take two years?

In short, it will take nearly two years because church organizations, while filled with full-time disciples of Jesus Christ, do operate on a volunteer basis when it comes to the ‘people power’ of staffing such an undertaking. With the search plan developed, this coming winter the Search Committee will begin its work developing a “Parish Profile” for CGS. The committee will engage all members in prayer, conversation, surveys and feedback about who CGS is as a community and where we see the Holy Spirit leading us in the future. As the “Parish Profile” gets finalized, then the committee will begin its work on developing a vision for calling a new Rector—someone whose experience, ministry, personality and faith life would be a match for CGS. This “Rector Call” description will be finalized and publicized in cooperation with the Diocesan office. At this point the Search Committee will ‘screen in’ those applicants it wants to get to know more deeply, hold Skype interviews, then discern those they want to explore for any site visits. Like

most significant life decisions, finding the right match in calling a new Rector will take time, prayer and listening to the Spirit's leading.

What are the roles of current Clergy during the Interim—what are they each responsible for specifically and will they all preach?

Each will preach on a rotation reflective of their hours serving the community. As the saying goes, "Teamwork makes a dream work" so the clergy, along with all other leadership, will provide a specific presence during this time. During the interim, the Priest in Charge role is likened to the Rector during an established pastorate; the Curate role is likened to Assistant Rector. Pastor Fred, while fulfilling the role of Interim Consultant, will support closely the ministry of our Search Committee, liaison with the Diocese and be a presence of support to the larger congregation and staff for any transitional issues which naturally occur during change.

What have Sunday Church Service attendance numbers been like this fall now that we're settling into the Interim?

The Church attendance numbers for Sunday Services have been within the 'normal' range this fall. This means there's been a range of 5-15 people, either more in some cases or less in other cases, at each service. We are right on target in terms of retention for this time of year as well as the Interim period. Per usual, Pastor Alanna will prepare a detailed report of attendance for the Annual Meeting in January. Also, the fantastic fall weather has been a blessing, and has called many of our members to worship in God's first Church...the great outdoors!

# CGS Creating a Safe Space for All: Security and Safety Updates

As a faith community CGS is committed to offering our building as safe place for our members, visitors, and outreach ministries in the community. From our regular “Safe Church” training to protect vulnerable populations within our community to physical plant security. Due to violence in public spaces, and specifically in worshipping communities, CGS has taken more security measures over the year to ensure that we continue to offer a safe place.

Measures taken thus far:

- Installing security cameras on-site both inside an outside the building
- Installing emergency responder buttons to be used during worship or any large gathering should the police need to be called immediately
- Installing a key code access pad for our Parish Hall Auditorium door. This allows staff to know who accesses the building and when.
- Developing a Security Protocol for Lay Groups who meet at the church during the week, so they know who to contact in case of a disruption in the building.

Plans for the coming year:

- Clergy will convene a Safety Team with Lay Leadership to review on-going safety needs in our community
- Consultation with Nashua Police Department Officer Bill Adamson on safety measures and training for leadership.
- Regularly scheduled emergency preparedness training, fire drills and safety drills.

In the words of my wise older sister “Safety never takes a holiday,” so as part of your extended community and living space CGS wants to do everything we can to make sure we offer a safe space for all. Please contact Pastor Kate with any questions or feedback.

## Winter Book Group for “The New Jim Crow”

In their most recent conventions, both the Episcopal Church and the Episcopal Church in New Hampshire have encouraged all faithful communities to prayerfully examine the intertwined issues of race and mass incarceration as some of the most pressing social justice issues of our time. This winter, Pastor Kate and Kathy Olson would like to invite interested members of the parish to gather together on three Monday evenings (January 22, January 29, and February 5) from 6:30pm to 8:00pm to read and discuss the New York Times bestseller, “The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Color Blindness” by Michelle Alexander. With only 5 percent of the world’s population, the U.S. incarcerates almost twenty-five percent of the world’s lawfully imprisoned population, with policies that particularly target the poor and people of color. As followers of Jesus, reflecting on this book is one small way to answer Christ’s command to be with those who are imprisoned.
